

GUEST SPEAKER TREVOR McALISTER 8 MAY 2024

Trevor McAlister (a member of the Rotary Club of Epping) had been an Industrial Arts teacher in a Secondary School for about 10 years till in October 2022 the launching of his book *Exploring Hidden Sydney*, opened up huge opportunities for him. He has a hobby of walking around Sydney and has an eye for fine details that a normal person would tend to miss.

Some snippets from his talk:

In the early days the focal point of Sydney was the Sydney Town Hall. On the southern side the Sydney seal was erected around 1880 with a delightful

sandstone carving, "I take but I surrender". It's interesting to note that the Aboriginals never surrendered.

Another old and interesting landmark is the Cemetery in Sydney that covers the 1792-1820 period. In 1814, a young convict architect by the name of Francis Greenway arrived in Sydney. He was instrumental in erecting some well known buildings.

In 1868 the foundation stone was laid for the first British Royal. It is interesting to note that the Queen Victoria building that was built in 1895 is actually sitting on the top of an underground toilet in Barrack Street.

The General Post Office was the last sandstone building built in 1848 in Wynyard Square. It was another significant building with sculptures of life in the 1800s including that of Flinders who was the first to travel around Australia and call it Australia.

1879 saw building of the Garden Palace that was the biggest building ever built in the colony. Unfortunately, it was burnt down.

Governor Macquarie was the one who built a wall around his house that is known as Macquarie Place that was actually Aboriginal ground.



The first Hospital that was built in 1803 was fabricated from parts brought from England. A wall was built to prevent the entry of rats that were actually using the stairs to get in!

finally spotted him he was escorted back to the bus via the Maltese ear pinching method, and we were on our way again. Some Mothers do have 'em!!




