

Rotary District Changeover 2024 - 2025

District 9685 held their changeover at the Wentworthville Leagues Club on Saturday 29 June 2024. The incoming District Governor, Niranjan Deodhar from the Rotary Club of Beecroft now takes over from the outgoing District Governor Christine Owen.

DG Niranjan also had his own cheer squad with him on the night, His wife Isha and his daughter and son were there too. Although I suppose his wife and daughter were probably not exactly cheer squad as his wife Isha is actually the incoming president of Beecroft Rotary Club and his daughter Vinita is also on the board of Beecroft Rotary.

Prior to the actual Changeover, outgoing DG, Christine Owen, gave a talk about her year (2023-2024) and all the things that she was able to achieve through her year and she also gave an Acknowledgement of Clubs and Individuals Awards Presentation.

It was nice to see that our neighboring club, Hornsby District with whom we have shared many social events under the presidential guidance of Sardia was awarded the Best Small Club Award. (Punch above their weight, recoup lost members and donate to the Malaria Vaccine Project through their Foreign Coin Repatriation Program with well over \$500,000 raised.) It was also good to see a longtime special friend to our Club and a longtime supporter of Schools and Communities in Timor-Leste Theo Glockermann (OAM) (Medal of the Order of Australia) received a Citation and Special Award (Rotary International Service Above Self Award) for his work in Timor-Leste over the last 30 odd years. Theo is known as 'Uncle Theo' to over 1000 kids. (Wife Georgia)



A posthumous Citation was made to Bob Aitkin (AM) (Member of the Order of Australia) from the Lower Blue Mountains Club, who for many years had been involved with District and was the person who had originally instigated the purchase of the property in Parramatta which became the head office for RDU. (Rotary Down Under Supplies). That has since been sold and the new RDU premises is now at Norwest. Bob's wife and daughter were there to accept the award on Bob's behalf. Lindsay May and Tania Mace both received a Lane Cove Citizen Award and Tania also received a Leadership Award.

There was also a very special award that was supposed to be given on that night to our very own incoming President **Sivaraj Sagathaven**, but unfortunately Sivaraj was not able to attend on the night and received his Excellence Award and Citation from Christine Owen at the Warringah Club Changeover instead. This Award is the Rotarian Excellence Award which is given to an individual Rotarian once a year for the great work that they have done for Rotary, Sivaraj has received this award for the great work he has done over the years for the many Vocational Excellence Awards that he has put together and was always there to insure that the clubs had many awardees and that the program was always a success with many friends and relatives in attendance to all of his award nights. When I asked Sivaraj to bring his award with him to a meeting he said that he needed at least a week's notice so that he could work out at the gym in order to be able to carry it. (See page 4)



After the official handover of the District Governor's Collar, DG Niranjan gave a talk about his past and work history in IT and his work in International community support. He also gave us a summary of what he would like to achieve in his year as District Governor. We were shown a brief video from incoming International President, Stephanie Urchick, who told us the story about how she helped to supply water to needy communities in poor countries by purifying dirty polluted water to clean drinking water by means of pipes and filtration. Dirty water would enter from one side of the pipes and come out as clean water on the other side. After the piped water was turned off a couple of boys watching the process asked Stephanie if she could 'show them that magic again'. This is where she got the idea for the new theme, *The Magic of Rotary*.

Our incoming Community Group 5 Leader, Ruth Vumbaca, has hit the ground running with already having a zoom meeting for all her 13 clubs with the presidents and presidents- elect being asked to attend. Unfortunately from a possible 26 people, only 4 presidents and elects were present including Sivaraj and

myself. But calling a meeting at 4.00pm on a Friday afternoon, you probably could not expect much more. But she is looking at kicking off a few projects that would involve all Clubs participating together. (Getting all the Clubs to work together could be a challenging feat in itself, so we wish her all the luck in getting it going.)

The next **District Conference** will be held on Friday 21 and Saturday 22 March, 2025 at the Pullman, in Penrith. The Pullman is located adjacent to the Panthers Leagues Club. DG Christine Owen 2023-2024

Presidents' Meeting – 27 July 2024 via Zoom

The first Presidents' Meeting led by District Governor (DG) Niranjan Deodhar was attended by 62 participants. DG Niranjan then introduced his new District Team that included Joe Dickens as the Club Service District Chair and Neville Hanson as incoming District Secretary.

Steve Thorp presented the current District financial situation that registered a profit of \$6,000 against a budgeted loss of \$35,000. The Current cash reserves stands at \$338,000.

The meeting also covered youth programmes, including a COTA approved E-Interact programme and up coming training sessions. Winter RYPEN has been planned to be held at Katoomba Christian Convention Centre. The District Conference that will be held on 21-22 March 2025 at Pullman in Penrith aims to target about 500-600 attendees.

The group also discussed the importance of establishing contacts with the national media outlets to enhance Rotary's public image and community engagement. Election of Club Conference Champions by 12 August to drive participation. Clubs have been asked to make a three minute presentation of their favourite project at the District Conference. The notification of the conference topic for three minute presentation has to be made by 26 August 2024.

Presidents are encouraged to support the Rotary Foundation. There was also a warning about emails targeting Rotary Clubs. Importance of two-factor authorisation for payments was emphasised.

The DG thanked the participants for participating in the Zoom meeting.

Science and Engineering Challenge

This is an initiative developed by the University of Newcastle in conjunction with Rotary Clubs in 2000, beginning as information nights in rural areas. The first Event was on the Central Coast, an activity for National Science Week, now it is held Nation-wide. All equipment (owned and maintained by University of Newcastle) for each activity is transported in plastic crates, packed into specialised vans.



During July Gil Stokes and I volunteered again for the most recent Science and Engineering Challenge held at Ravenswood, Gordon. There were 9 schools (Years 9 and 10) and nine activies.

This year I was allocated "Fish Traps" - a special sloping platform with "nails" to divert the fish (marbles) in several directions. This was tested 3 times—average recorded eg. Scenario 1: "Catch half of the medium fish to allow the fish population to be sustained for next season". Catch Goal = 50%medium fish (12 marbles). Penalty: each "small fish caught" = lose 2pts. The students were motivated and worked well together.

In nearly 20 years of assisting at the Science and Engineering Challenge I have only encountered one disruptive boy! Two Newcastle University Staff are in charge of the activities.

Rotary have been a critical part of the SEC since its inception. The cooperation between Rotary and their communities is the key to ensuring successful events around Australia. In most regions, local Rotary clubs take the lead role in organising Challenge and Discovery Day events. They bring together local communities, businesses, schools, professional organisations and universities to support the Challenge financially and organisationally. Over 2,500 Rotarians also volunteer at events each year, which means many give up time from their jobs, businesses or families. One of the main reasons Rotary became involved with the SEC was because Rotary has a long history of working with young people, often in the area of the sciences.

With Berowra RSL's success of the Wednesday night food specials, and it has been pleasing to see our venue buzzing, they have needed the whole auditorium for food service. We have therefore been in the Board Room — a private cosy space and quite satisfactory just for Club members to meet. However, as there are no audio visual facilities readily in the Board Room it is difficult to invite a guest speaker to make a presentation without AV facilities.

For our last meeting when we were to have a speaker on Ukraine, and several visitors to hear her speak we reluctantly postponed the speaker. When we arrived at the Club we were given the space downstairs, with food service, and with a very large screen and suitable AV facilities — it's major drawback is that we also share it with any other patrons who wish to use the space for pool, table tennis etc. We do need to consider our options for meetings. We will go ahead with our speakers in August and assess the suitability of the current arrangements.




